### Chairman's Letter

Dear Friends

Our visit in February, which was the main theme of our previous newsletter, certainly validated all the work that is going on to help pupils in the Mombasa area of Kenya. Here in the UK we do tend to take education for granted but, if we are to help to solve the manifold problems in Kenya for the long term, it is certainly going to be by ensuring that the citizens of tomorrow get a good sound education.

And how true this is!

I look back on how I came to be involved in EducAid Africa as a Head Teacher in Solihull. Here was a venture that really could make a difference to individual children, their families and their community and this was borne out on my visits to the Mombasa area. Here is a charity where every penny is going to these individuals. I have met each sponsored pupil personally and can vouch for their authenticity, their needs and the added value we are making to their lives. This is not something every charity can claim! Educaid Africa has been able to achieve such a great deal because many people have become interested in supporting a charity through which they can learn about the individual children they

are helping. Furthermore, they recognise that the money they donate actually goes to these pupils and not to the administration of the charity.

Since returning from our latest visit to Kenya in February, we have spoken to a variety of groups and shown them videos and photographs of what we found and experienced there. This has included illustrated talks to Solihull U3A, Shirley Baptist Church and four Beaver Scout Colonies. Everywhere we have been warmly welcomed and great interest has been shown in what has been achieved through people's generous donations.

We have now adopted a Mission Statement for EducAid that helps us to focus on our prime purpose.

We have firm links in this area which means we can use our funds directly to enable students in poverty to access education and a healthier lifestyle, whilst contributing some of the appropriate equipment to schools and pupils

It is said that education means liberation and how true this is. One of our pupils stated, "Where there was no hope, you gave me hope."

Equipment in Primary Schools
When you visit an English primary school you
will see a wealth of equipment from
computers to counting blocks, from paint
materials to sports equipment. Visit a
Kenyan primary school and all you will find
are a few books (often one amongst three),
pencils, paper and a blackboard. Since our
visit in February this year we have given
money to purchase equipment such as balls,
skipping ropes, paint and books. As you can
see from the pictures the new equipment has
given the pupils a great deal of pleasure.





### Sponsored Event

This year we decided to change the format of the Sponsored Run and instead of holding the event at the Norman Green Centre, we held fund raising events in two local schools: Coppice Junior and Greswold Primary. On the 18<sup>th</sup> October Coppice held a Fun Walk and Chat. On a beautiful sunny afternoon 230 children and some parents were to be found walking the boundary of the school. The plan was for Year 3 to walk with Year 6 and Year 4 to walk with Year 5. For the allotted 45 minutes the children walked and chatted. Staff acted as marshals and encouragers as the pupils walked the course that was about half a mile each circuit.

One of the Trustees walked with the children and everyone completed four laps and had plenty of time to chat. All the walkers were asked to contribute £1 with some pupils giving more. The children raised £350, which will go towards sponsoring Monica in her secondary education.

Thank you to Mrs J McCarthy for allowing the children to take part in the fund raising event and to the staff who marshalled and supported the children, in particular to Mrs Noble for organising the event.

### Greswold Report

The sun shone as we headed to the field in the name of charity. Greswold has been supporting the EducAid charity for a number of years. It sponsors children in Kenya who would not be able to go to school without the help of the charity. You have done a great job raising money, children, as the total by the end of the day had reached over £2400! Wow! ### New Pupil Opportunities for Sponsors

It is the time of the year that we have to assess how many new pupils we can sponsor. There is always a great need and we receive far more requests than we can meet. The difficult decisions have to be made by our representative in Mombasa who knows the circumstances of these children and, based on guidelines of need and potential, he allocates the sponsorship.

To sponsor a child costs £1300 for four years or £325 a year or £27 per month
